## ***Where You Live: Ecologically Speaking***

In order to successfully design and maintain a natural home landscape, it is crucial to be familiar with the native plants of your area, the combinations in which they occur, and the processes of change that they undergo. While the importance of this understanding may seem obvious, it is often overlooked in traditional gardening instruction. This portion of our program will analyze and illustrate native plant communities that can serve as 'design models' for natural plantings on your property.

As an independent tour guide, Adrian has also led birding trips throughout the United States and abroad. As an educator Adrian has lectured, written articles, and produced an educational program on "Owls" for the Audubon Society. He is also an accomplished avian illustrator and photographer, whose images have been published in various publications.*
